Recent Trip to Scotland

Scripture: Galatians 1: 13-17 (Example of Gaelic story telling --- Book written to the Celtic)

13 For you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, how intensely I persecuted the church of God and tried to destroy it. 14 I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people and was extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers. 15 But when God, who set me apart from my mother's womb and called me by his grace, was pleased 16 to reveal his Son in me so that I might preach him among the Gentiles, my immediate response was not to consult any human being. 17 I did not go up to Jerusalem to see those who were apostles before I was, but I went into Arabia. Later I returned to Damascus.

Reading #1:

On Presence: The Celtic Tradition, unlike Calvinism that suppressed it in many parts of the Celtic world, is not Sabbatarian in its perspective. The emphasis is not on set apart times of rest, or so-called 'holy days' or 'holy places,' places that are distinct from every day and every place. Rather it encourages a type of restful awareness in everything that we do. It is about holding a stillness of perspective in the midst of busyness. It is about being alert of the light of the sun in the midst of morning work or to the mystery of the moon at night. It is about tasting the goodness of God in the fruit of the earth and the love of God on the lips of another. It is about knowing ...that in all things we are surrounded by eternity. (pp108-109, The Book of Creation: An introduction to Celtic Spirituality, J Philip Newell, 1999)

Reading #2

On Liminal Spaces: In Scotland the meeting of the day with the night is called the gloaming... In Celtic legend the twilight of the period of two lights, is a mystical time when an encounter between the visible world and the invisible world is more likely to

occur... It is the transitional moment of seeing that is neither the day's nor the night's but the merging of the two. It is the marriage of the time of the sun with the time of the moon. It is a theophany of the harmony of God. (pp 62-63, Ibid)
